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

Summary of WLPOA (Wolf Laurel Property Owners Association) Memberships

The WLPOA is a non-profit organization which provides members with social and educational opportunities within Wolf Laurel (WL). Winter Walks during a Challenging Winter

When the Wolf Pack and "Walk in the Woods" programs pause for the winter, a number of us still meet for a weekly walk of two to three miles. And there are other groups who walk regularly over winter, but this report relates to a group that met on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. through December, switching to 1 p.m. after cold January makes it easier to meet during the warmth of afternoons.

This fall, the off-season was unusual in the following ways:

- Helene chased many people away early, at the end of September and the beginning of October.
- Downed trees made many roads unusable for a while.
- Parking areas at trail heads were damaged or full of debris.
- Trail assessment is time consuming, and we still do not know the condition of all the trails.

By January, we had other problems:

- Consistently coldest temperatures on record.
- Over a foot of snow and ice that kept roads unsafe and trails unmanageable.
- Viruses or other health issues that knocked some of us out for weeks.

Yet we did accomplish:

- 10 walks with only one duplication (Symphony Trail)
- A variety of walks, from those in Wolf Laurel's woods, to some road and golf course loops, Beaver Lake Park, and Rocky Fork Park.
- Groups averaging 6 people.
- Total of 50 people walking.
- Trail maintenance on the Sugar Fork Loop Trail, thanks to Tim Carrigan and his chain saw, as well to the helpers who picked up branches behind Tim's cutting (see photo).

Chain Saw Heroes! Shout out to those who not only cleared trails, but got



trapped neighbors out when trees blocked the way after the storm – Tim Carrigan, Rick Zinter, Doug Orman, Tom Bush, and Joe Capers.

Wolf Laurel's Firewise USA® Initiative

The community of Wolf Laurel is located in an area defined as a Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) where homes and communities meet or intermingle with undeveloped wildland vegetation, resulting in an increased risk for exposure to wildfire. After thousands of trees were recently downed during Hurricane Helene, many property owners expressed an elevated concern for the threat of wildfire. To assist our community in reducing our risk, the WLRMS Natural Resources Committee in collaboration with the NC Forest Service (NCFS) completed the initial process to attain recognition as a Firewise USA® Community.

Based on recommendations from a community risk assessment conducted by the NCFS for Wolf Laurel, we created a 3-year action plan outlining initial steps to improve our wildfire preparedness. Achieving the Firewise USA® recognition signifies that our community will take a step beyond being concerned about the risks of wildfire, and work together to take action.

Wolf Laurel's Firewise USA® initiative begins with educating the community. Based on decades of research and wildfire data, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) designed the Firewise USA® program to provide homeowners with proven practices to establish a "defensible space" which will withstand embers and prevent flames or surface fire from igniting the home and its immediate surroundings. In doing so, homeowners not only reduce risk on their own property, but their neighbors' and the community as well.

The Wolf Laurel Firewise Committee invites all owners in all HOAs to participate at whatever level you're able. We'll be holding meetings, presentations and events, as well as sending eblasts. There are two important goals for owners to take action, even if you cannot take any other steps: 1) identify your property at the street with reflective numbers on a metal sign for first responders, and 2) have a free home wildfire risk assessment by a trained professional to receive a tailored list of simple steps you can take to "harden" your home against wildfire.
